2023 Operations

- **Capital Campaign**—Completed a successful capital campaign, raising over \$750,000 to renovate a larger store/studio space. (See page 15 for supporters)
- Improved Language Access—Revised and translated consignor program information, contracts, and financial documents, which are now available in seven languages (plus English). (Supported by the WNY Foundation)
- New Board Members and Officers—Welcomed several new board members, including a new President, Vice President, Treasurer, and Secretary. (See page 18 for new board member details)
- New Hires—Hired a full-time Business and Finance Director. Our staff also grew in early 2024 with new hires in our Retail Manager and Second Stitch Manager positions.

Renovations are nearly complete. In April 2024, Stitch Buffalo will be taking up residence in our new store/studio at 284 Plymouth Avenue. We will occupy the building's entire first floor and have room for all of our programs to grow.

3. Community Table and Kitchenette ► At


the heart of the space is a large community table and kitchenette, where community members can gather to enjoy a cup of tea and stitch together.

4. Sewing and Weaving Studio ► Expanded studio space for sewing, weaving, and more. This will allow us to welcome more artisans and take on bigger jobs.


5. Wet Studio ► A room for dyeing, printing, and other messy processes—plus a washer and dryer.

Signature Outfit for a Signature Album Cover

A signature album cover calls for a signature outfit. Stitch Buffalo helped Buffalo musician Bean Friend show his punk roots and mariachi sound with hand embroidery on black Levi's jeans and a jean jacket—in a style inspired by the traditional charro outfits worn by Mexican mariachi performers.

With design support from Executive Director Dawne Hoeg, Refugee Women's Workshop member Ser Eh Paw (Burma) handembroidered traditional white motifs, roses

Palwasha Basir Collab with Grammy Award Winning Artist John Legend

For several years, Stitch Buffalo has partnered with the Afghan Makers project from Nest to support artisans in starting their own Etsy shops. One Stitch Buffalo artisan, Palwasha Basir, has been especially successful!

Palwasha is a trained tailor who arrived in Buffalo from Afghanistan in 2019 with her husband Abdul and three of her five children. Despite heavy restrictions at the time, **the family was able to immigrate because Abdul's career (working as a transportation supervisor at the U.S. Embassy in Kabul) put his family at risk from both the Taliban and ISIS.** Palwasha and Abdul were integral to launching Stitch Buffalo's face-mask sewing

program at the start of the pandemic and Palwasha has continued to bring her sewing and design skills to the Refugee Women's Workshop ever since.

In 2023, award-winning recording artist and entrepreneur John Legend selected Palwasha as one of twelve collaborating artists from Nest's Afghan Makers program to create a limited edition ornament for his holiday collection. Through this partnership, Legend and his design team helped showcase Palwasha's work to a much wider audience and generated incredible year-end sales for her shop. We're so proud to see her recognized and celebrated for her beautiful work!

Khawar Walizai Amiri A Lifelong Commitment to Empowering Women

Khawar Walizai Amiri learned to stitch at the age of fifteen. She was the only one of her sisters to study under her mother, a skilled artisan who inspired her to learn knitting, crochet, and embroidery skills. This work with her mother ignited a life-long love of learning.


Living in the Khost Province of Afghanistan, Khawar was able to attend a special school because her father had a government job. As an adult, she married, had six children, and continued her education. **She became the Head of Women's Affairs for Khost Province and worked to ensure girls had access to schools and education.** One of her biggest successes was organizing a Masters Degree program for women in Khost to study in India, funded by the U.S. Embassy. In 2013, she received a Women of Courage award from the Regional Command East (the government branch overseeing fourteen provinces in eastern Afghanistan).

Following the Taliban offensive and the collapse of the Afghan government in 2021, **Khawar's work for women's rights made her family a target of violence.** They were evacuated to Abu Dhabi, then emigrated to Buffalo, New York, in 2022.

Today, Khawar shares her skills, embroidery traditions, and commitment to empowering women as a member of the Refugee Women's Workshop at Stitch Buffalo. She says, "I am free and this is good work for me to make money and make myself busy." Products by Khawar are available now at the Stitch Buffalo store. Pitch 10 Competition

Stitch Buffalo was thrilled to win the 2023 Pitch 10 competition, hosted by United Way of Buffalo and Erie County and Next Generation United. Best of all, the win came with a \$25,000 award to help outfit our community table, where women from around the world can gather at the heart of our new space.

Highmark Bright Blue Futures Award

Stitch Buffalo was one of just sixteen organizations from across five states to receive a "Bright Blue Futures" award from the Highmark Foundation. The award honors organizations with unique ideas to impact community health. It included a \$15,000 grant to support our work.

Environmental Excellence Award

On Earth Day, Erie County Deputy Executive Lisa Chimera presented Stitch Buffalo with the Erie County Environmental Council's "Environmental Excellence Award." The award honored our Second Stitch program for its commitment to reducing textile waste.
